





For the last five years the Center for Bibliographical Studies and Research at the University of California, Riverside has been digitizing historical California newspapers. We now have some 400,000 pages available for searching online through the California Digital Newspaper Collection (CDNC), cdnc.ucr.edu.

This spring we are starting an ambitious and unique new project to collect and display contemporary newspapers, what we are calling our “born digital” project. We hope to collect PDFs of newspapers from California publishers as they are sent for printing, process those files with the necessary metadata, and make them available for searching on the CDNC. Other institutions around the country and the world have been collecting newspaper PDFs, but as of yet none have added the metadata necessary to make them full-text searchable. This project will be a first.




I write to ask you to consider participating in this born-digital pilot project. If you agree, we will set up the procedures to start collecting your PDFs as you produce them, our staff will process them with proprietary software we have licensed, and we will make the issues freely available to the public on the CDNC.

I am contacting small newspaper publishers around the state because, I fear, with declining budgets and limited staffs, small papers are most at risk of being lost. We will archive your papers, first on servers and tape drives and eventually we hope at the California Digital Library, and we will make them openly available in perpetuity through the CDNC. Together we can help to insure the survival of one of our state’s most important cultural heritages, its local papers.

This AGREEMENT is entered into this day of August 1st, 2010, by and between the Minnesota Newspaper Association and its participating member Newspapers ("Newspaper") and the Minnesota Historical Society ("MHS").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Newspaper is the owner of certain articles and publications protected by copyright (the "Copyrighted Works") and has the right to grant licenses under said Copyrighted Works;

WHEREAS, Newspaper agrees to have one or more of its Copyrighted Works converted to a digitized format to form Derivatives;

Whereas, MHS desires to obtain a license to convert the Copyrighted Works to a digitized format to form said Derivatives;

NOW, THEREFORE, Newspaper and MHS hereby agree as follows:

1. DEFINITIONS

- 1.1 "Copyrighted Works" shall mean all of the Newspaper's content and publications protected by copyright.
- 1.2 "Copyright Term" shall mean the period of time commencing on the Effective Date and ending with the expiration of the term for which the copyright on the Copyrighted Works is granted, unless earlier terminated in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement.
- 1.3 "Derivatives" shall mean MHS-created digitally formatted versions of the Copyrighted Works, and subject to copyright. MHS acknowledges and agrees that the copyrights in said Derivatives are owned by Newspaper.
- 1.4 "Licensed Product" shall mean any product that cannot be executed, reproduced, or modified, in whole or in part, without infringing the Newspaper's copyright(s) in the Copyrighted Works or their Derivatives.
- 1.5 "Territory" shall mean worldwide.

2. GRANT OF RIGHTS

- 2.1 Copyright License Grant. Newspaper hereby grants to MHS the non-exclusive right and license to create Derivatives of the Copyrighted Works in the Territory for the Copyright Term, unless this Agreement shall be sooner terminated as provided herein.
- 2.2 MHS shall be solely responsible for providing all funding and technical expertise for the development of the Derivatives.

2.3 Sublicenses. MHS shall not have the right to sublicense the rights g permission of the Newspaper.

2.4 End Users. Newspaper grants MHS the right to sell, distribute, loa Derivatives to _____ (entity (ies)) ("End Users") during tt of sale of the Derivatives to End Users, MHS agrees to share revenue with N the total revenue obtained by MHS for any and all sales associated with the Users, by written agreement, to use of the Derivatives for non-commercial j distribution or resale.

2.5 Sale. MHS agrees not to sell, distribute, loan, or otherwise provid Derivatives to any individuals or organizations except those set forth in Sect the Newspaper.

2.6 Retained Rights. Newspaper specifically retains all rights of every k granted to MHS herein.

3. COPYRIGHT

3.1 Title. MHS acknowledges that title to the Copyrights in the Copyright with Newspaper and that any Derivatives shall include a copyright notice ther "Copyright (year of publication of Copyrighted Work), (Newspaper name). / publication of Copyrighted Work), (Newspaper name) All Rights Reserved." or portions thereof in such manner and location as to give reasonable notice Derivatives.

3.2 Agreement Not to Challenge. MHS agrees not to challenge, directly Newspaper in the Copyrighted Works or Derivatives.

4. ASSIGNMENT

This Agreement is personal to MHS and no rights or obligations may be assign consent of Newspaper, except no such consent will be required to assign this business to which this Agreement pertains or to a purchaser of substantially Agreement, so long as such successor or purchaser shall agree in writing to b hereof prior to such assignment.
