- Open infrastructure for open access (OA) books
- Supporting the global transition to OA for academic books
- Providing services for publishers, funders, researchers , libraries
- OAPEN operates three platforms:
  - OAPEN Library (2010) [library.oapen.org](http://library.oapen.org)
  - Directory of Open Access Books (2013) [doabooks.org](http://doabooks.org)
  - OAPEN OA Books Toolkit (2020) [oabooks-toolkit.org](http://oabooks-toolkit.org)



# Mission and values

## Mission

- Increase discoverability of peer-reviewed OA books
- Promote and build trust in OA book publishing

## Values

- Independent, not-for-profit
- Cannot be sold or acquired
- Guided by the Principles of Open Scholarly Infrastructure (POSI)
  - Conducted self-audit in May 2023 (to be reviewed in 2025)

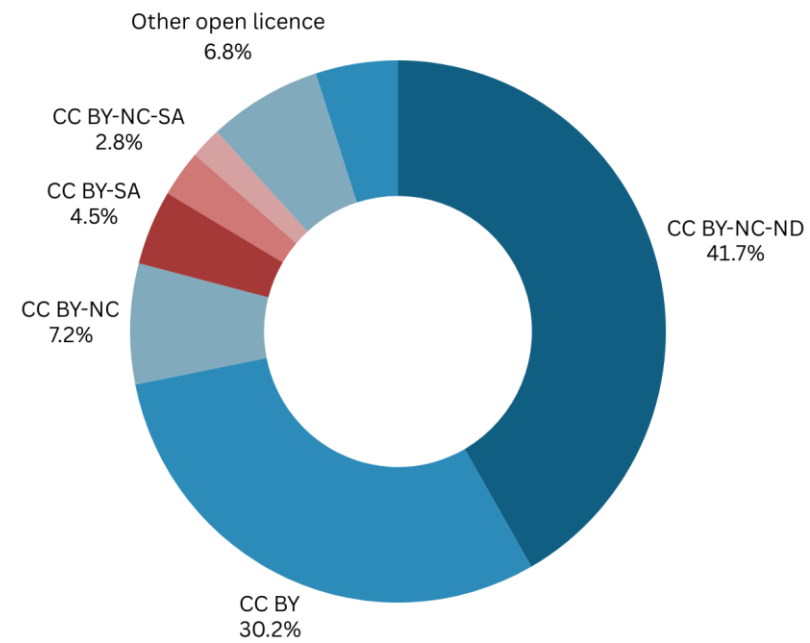
# The OAPEN Library – a global digital library

- Over 1.5 million monthly COUNTER downloads

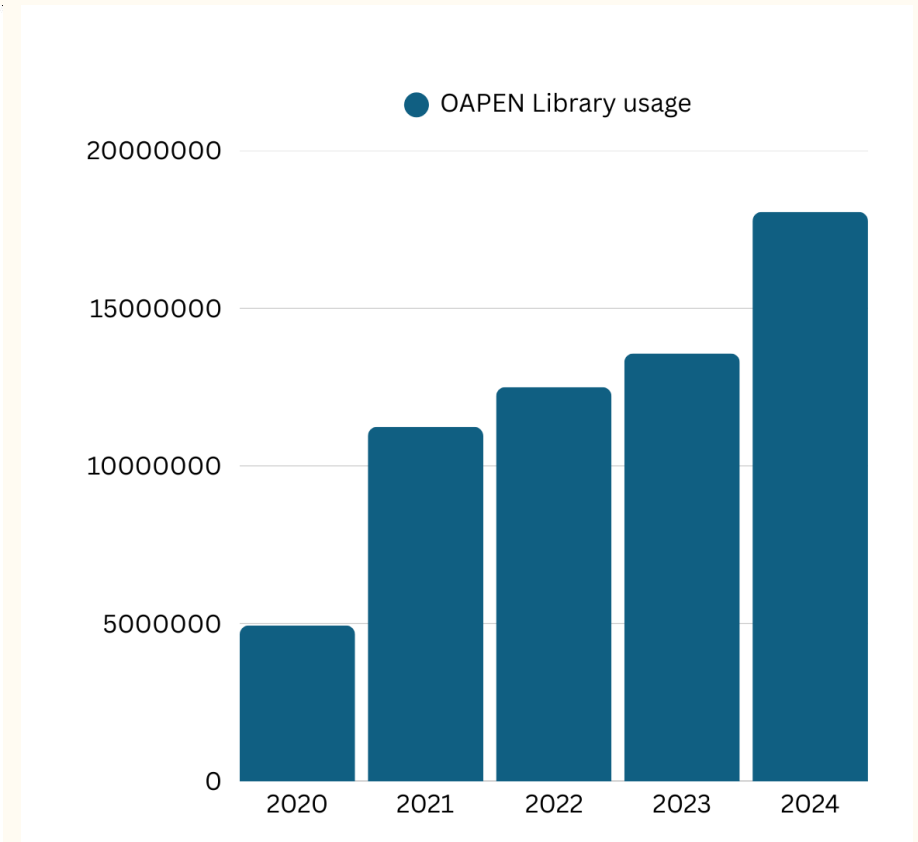

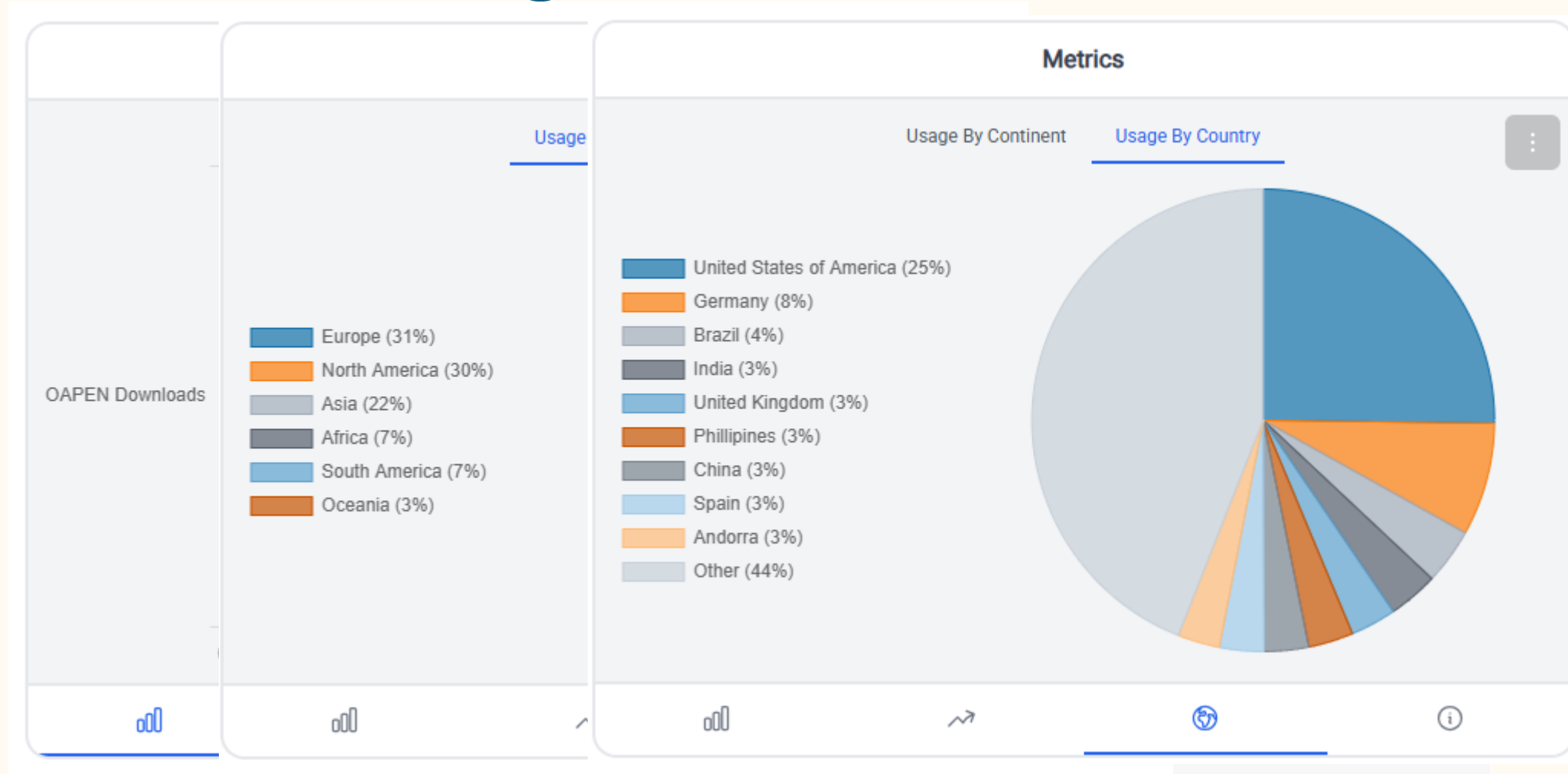


# Global & growing usage of the OAPEN Library

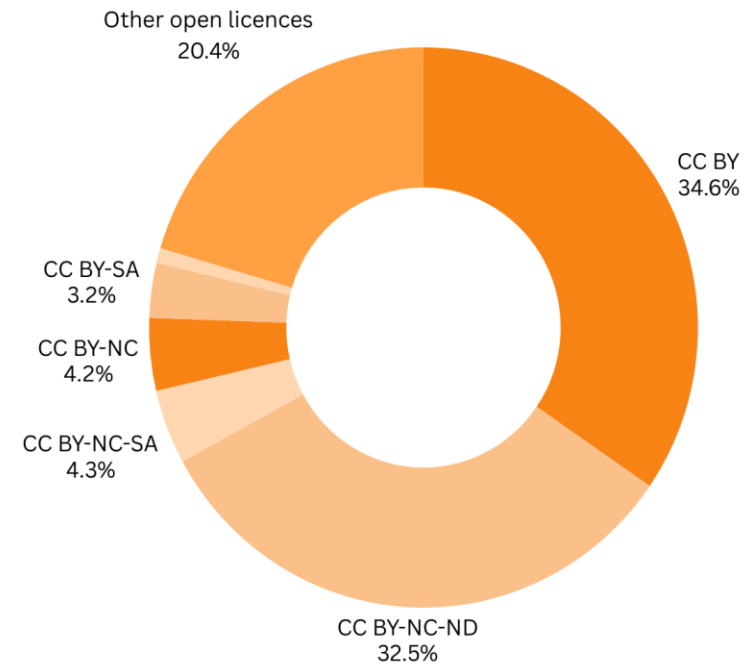

- Launched in 2013
- Free, searchable index of 93,500+ OA titles
- 750+ publishers
- 95+ languages
- Free for publishers to participate upon meeting inclusion criteria
- Metadata freely available under CC0
- Built on open-source software DSpace 6
- Server hosted in CERN's Data Center
- Co-managed with OpenEdition

# Peer Review Information Service for Monographs (PRISM)

- Provides publishers with the opportunity to display information about their peer review procedures on publisher and title level
- Supports transparency around the quality assurance process of academic book publishing
- PRISM widget available

Peer Review Information for University of Michigan Press

The publisher has registered with DOAB PRISM the Peer Review Process for 3 Peer Review types:

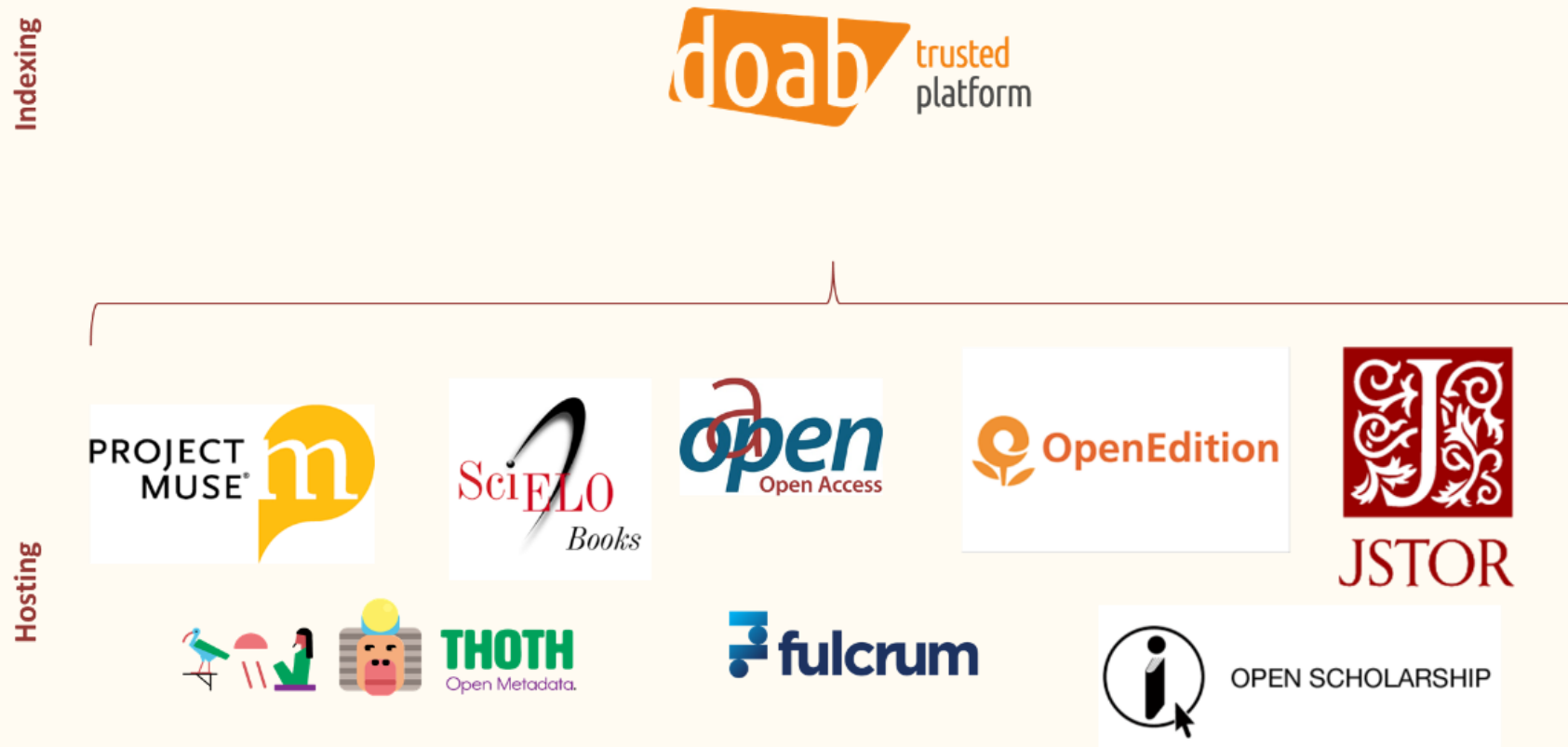

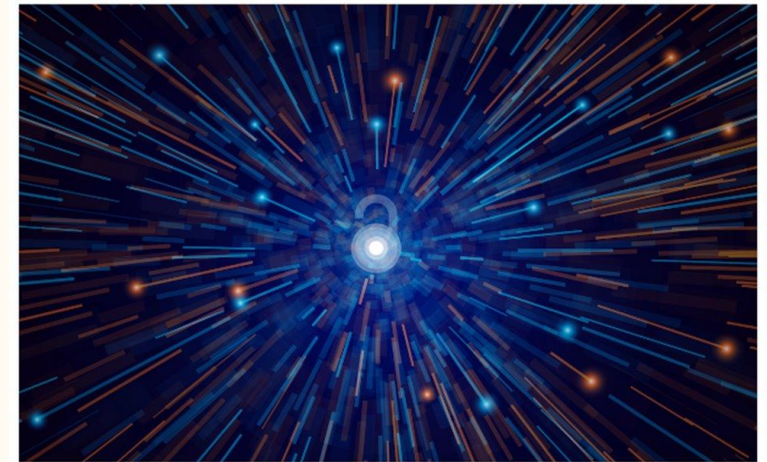

#### Sharing exports

Critical Making in the Age of AI invites students, teachers, learners, and digital humanists to explore making as scholarship. Inspired by the craft traditions of textile arts, this book combines a survey of forms of alternative scholarly communication—such as comics, GIFs, maps, games, and generative AI—and a pattern book, where patterns serve as starting points that makers can reimagine and remix. Firmly grounded in the humanities and utilizing free tools and platforms (including Twine, Voyant, and Tracery) wherever possible, this engaging and accessible guide to digital methods introduces and puts into practice concepts that are essential to preparing students to navigate a changing landscape of media and information without investing in proprietary software, dedicated lab space, or expensive creative tools. The book's eight patterns are especially appropriate for those just beginning to explore digital scholarly methods, and one goal of Critical Making in the Age of AI is to provide structure for work that is both meaningful and achievable with limited resources and time. By centering critical making through a design-justice and feminist lens, the coauthors model how inclusive and expansive approaches to making in research and teaching are vital to shaping the humanities of the future.

### Metadata feeds

OAPEN enables libraries and aggregators to access metadata in the following formats:

- ONIX (3.0) – XML
- MARCXML – based on the MARC21 format
- KBART – tab delimited text file
- CSV – comma delimited text file
- CSV – comma delimited text file
- JSON – JavaScript Object Notation
- RIS – Research Information Systems

### MARC21 metadata provided by

Penn State University Libraries provides three files:

- CC-licensed titles
- "Free-to-read" titles
- Titles where only a limited number of chapters are available

## DOAB MARC files

NOTE: Monthly updates to these files were paused in June 2024 because of a migration. Updates will resume when the migration is complete and the data is stable, hopefully in the fall of 2024.

These are MARC records created from metadata supplied by DOAB (Digital Open Access Book). They are tagged as "Open Access" in the MARC records.

DOAB-CCONLY-20240508.mrc (65,307 records): these records describe DOAB metadata. They are tagged as "Open Access" in the MARC records.

DOAB-NOCC-20240508.mrc (13,737 records): these records describe DOAB metadata. They are tagged as "Free-to-read" in the MARC records.

DOAB-NODOWNLOADS-20240508.mrc (851 records): these records describe DOAB metadata. There are no download links in these records; the link to the downloadable chapters.

Total number of records: 79,895

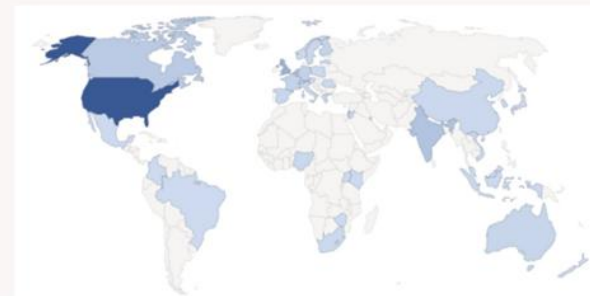

*This blog post was written in collaboration with Jeff Edmunds, Digital Access Coordinator at the Penn State University Libraries. It's a companion piece to the original blog post, 'Open Access metadata: OAPEN partners with Penn State University Libraries' (linked below).*

In October of 2023, OAPEN [announced a collaboration](#) with Penn State University Libraries whereby OAPEN's metadata was being transformed into MARC records, cleaned up and improved, and then made freely available for download (with a CC license assigned) via Penn State's institutional repository, [ScholarSphere](#).

Since September 2023, the MARC files have been downloaded hundreds of times (averaging 200-300 times per month) from many parts of the globe. The visualization below demonstrates exactly how far and wide these MARC files have been downloaded.

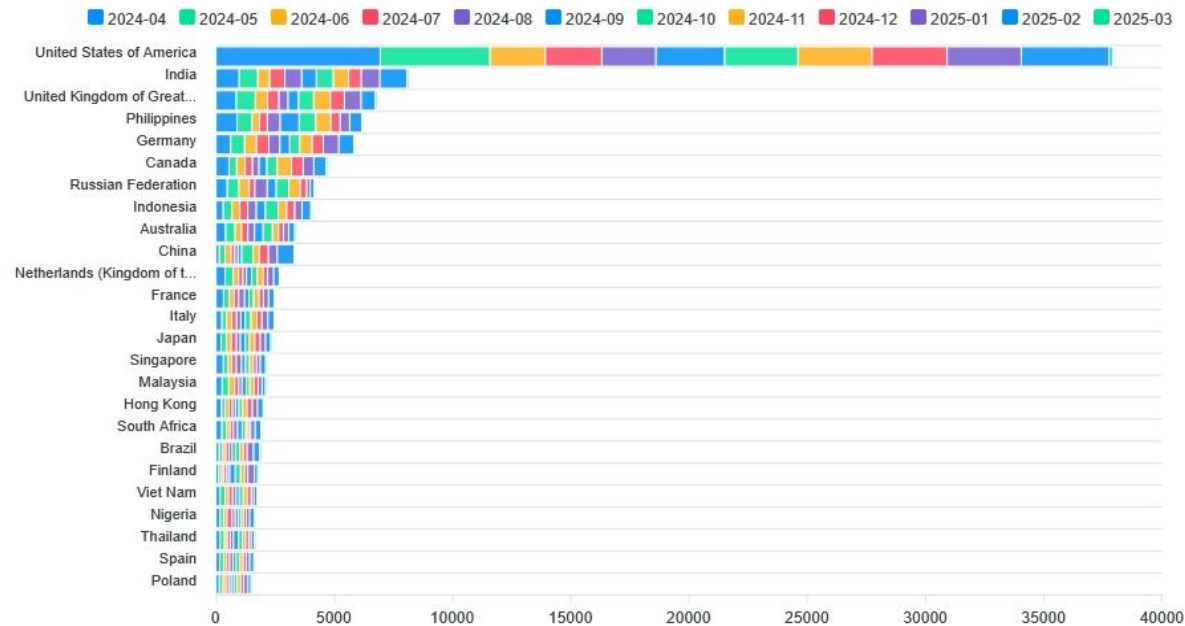

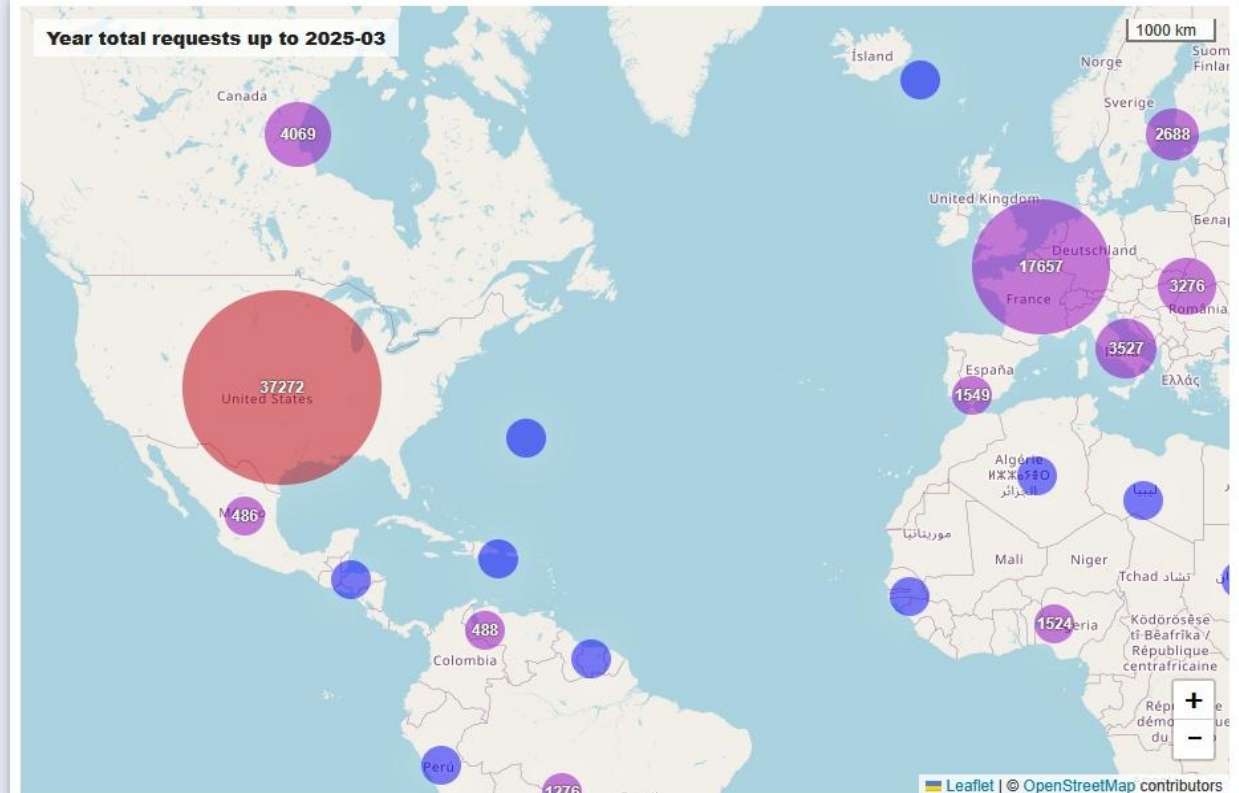


# OAPEN Library COUNTER usage dashboard

Top 25 requests per country per month up to 2025-03

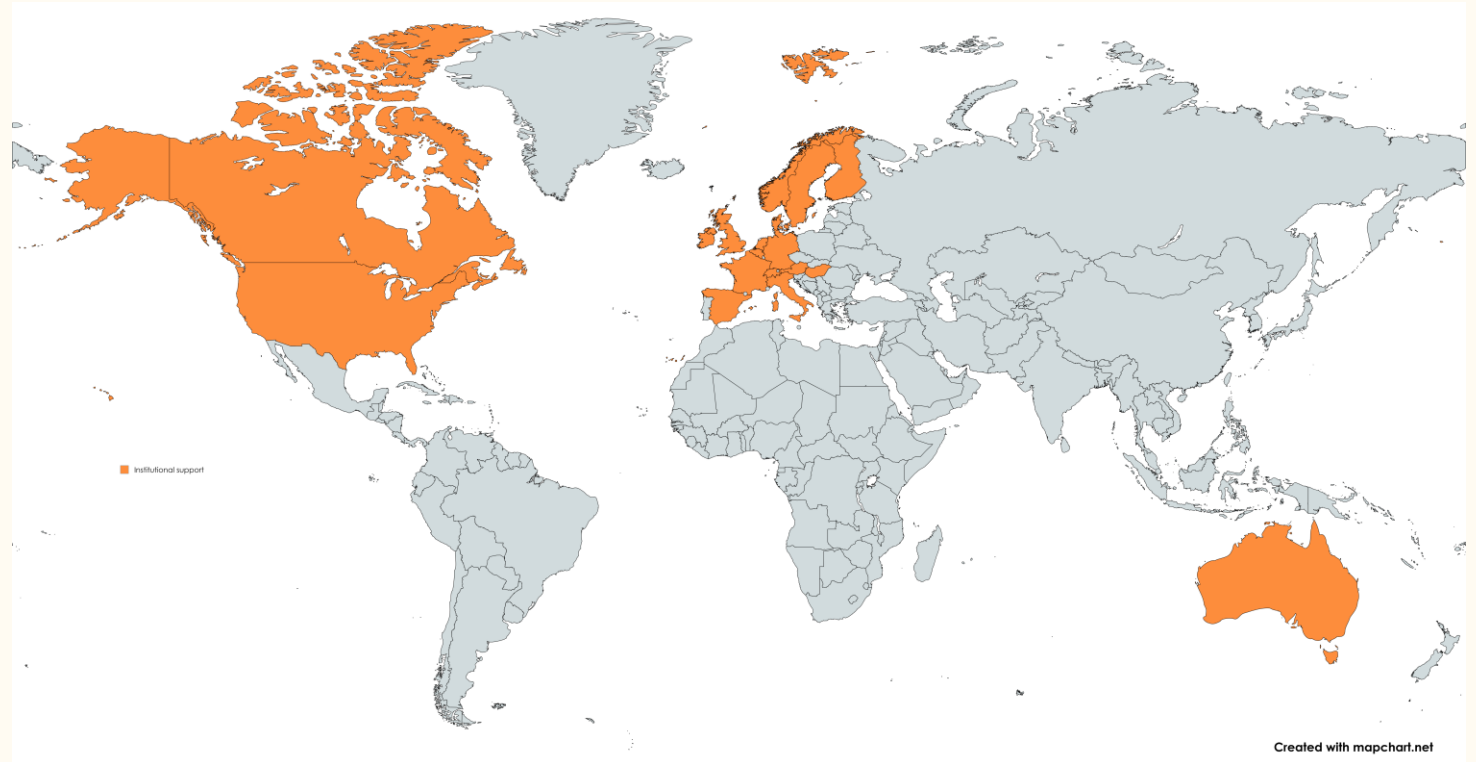


Year total requests up to 2025-03




