New Nominees for Election to the CRL Board of Directors: 2019-2022

Deborah Jakubs has served as the University Librarian and Vice Provost for Library Affairs at Duke University since 2005. Prior to that appointment, she was Director of Collections Services, the founding head of the International and Area Studies Department, and Librarian for Latin America and Iberia at Duke. As Visiting Program Officer at the Association of Research Libraries (ARL), she launched the Global Resources Program, a joint initiative of ARL and the Association of American Universities, and directed it from 1996 until 2002.

Dr. Jakubs holds a B.A. from the University of Wisconsin at Madison, an M.L.I.S. from the University of California at Berkeley, and an M.A. and Ph.D. in Latin American history from Stanford University. She is an adjunct associate professor of history at Duke.

She has been a consultant to library systems in Chile and Turkey, as well as in the U.S. She has served as Director and Associate Director of the Consortium on Latin American Studies at Duke and UNC-Chapel Hill, and was a founding member of the steering committee for the Program for Latin American Libraries and Archives, funded by The Andrew W. Mellon Foundation and administered for nearly twenty years by Harvard's Rockefeller Center for Latin American Studies.

Dr. Jakubs is a past president of ARL and of the Association of Southeastern Research Libraries (ASERL) and current chair of the Board of OLE (Open Library Environment). Jakubs has published on library management, global libraries and area studies, international education, and Latin American studies. Her scholarship has focused on the social history of Latin America, immigration to Argentina, and the history of tango.

Adriene Lim is the Dean of Libraries and Philip H. Knight Chair at the University of Oregon, where she provides administrative leadership and vision for a library system consisting of seven libraries with 180 staff and library faculty, and 300 student assistants. Before joining the University of Oregon, Lim was Dean of Libraries at Oakland University in Michigan, and held leadership roles at Portland State University, including Interim University Librarian, Associate University Librarian, and leader of Library Technologies. Lim also was the Head of Digital Library Services at Wayne State University and the Systems Librarian/ Head of Database Management for the Detroit Area Library Network (DALNET).

Dr. Lim earned her Ph.D. in library and information science (LIS), specializing in managerial leadership, at Simmons University in Boston. A first-generation college student and native of Detroit, she holds a master's degree in LIS and a bachelor's degree in Fine Arts, both summa cum laude, from Wayne State University. She has published and given presentations on managerial leadership, technology, diversity, and other topics at the international, national, and state levels, including one of the American Library Association's "Top 20 Articles in 2010", and has been active in ALA, the Library and Information Technology Association, and the Association of College and Research Libraries. She currently serves on the board of the Association of Research Libraries.

Dr. Lim was honored with the Michigan Library Association's Loleta D. Fyan Award for creative library service, and Portland State's Butler Award for excellence in faculty service. She also received a full, competitive scholarship for the doctoral program at Simmons University and was a fellow in the Frye Leadership Institute. She was elected to serve on the national LITA Board and ALA Council in 2010-2013.

David Magier has been an AUL at Princeton University since 2008. A specialist in South Asian studies, he previously served for 22 years in library management at Columbia University, as Director of Area Studies, Director of the Center for Human Rights Documentation and Research and as South/Southeast Asia Librarian.

As a member of the Library's senior Leadership Team at Princeton, Dr. Magier plays a central role in establishing library-wide strategic priorities and policies, program development and resource allocation, and in steering Princeton's inter-institutional relationships with key partners (including CRL, HathiTrust, ReCAP partners, and the Ivy Plus Libraries). The sphere of his responsibilities encompasses strategic leadership of 150 staff (including four department heads, 10 branch libraries, and about 55 subject specialist librarians across the system). His Division coordinates all collection development activities, initiatives for digital projects, acquisitions, resource sharing, preservation and conservation, research services, scholarly communication, and outreach.

Dr. Magier is responsible for high-level liaison with faculty in all University departments and programs. He holds a BA from Cornell and an MA and PhD in Linguistics (focusing on Indian and Pakistani languages) from UC Berkeley, and served on the faculty of linguistics at Berkeley and Michigan State University. He is known internationally for his leadership in developing collaborative digital library/global resources projects (including especially the Digital South Asia Library, the South Asia Resource Access on the Internet, the Yemeni Manuscript Digitization Initiative, the Latin American Ephemera Digital Archive, and – most recently – the South Asia Open Archives). An active contributor to CRL area studies groups for more than 30 years, and a member of the CSPC since 2016, Dr. Magier has been a strong proponent of careful collection shaping, coordinated collection development, collaborative initiatives for preservation of and open access to endangered archives, shared print projects, and the responsibility of the global community of research libraries to serve the needs of future as well as present scholars and teachers.

Denise Stephens is Vice Provost and University Librarian at Washington University in St. Louis. She has contributed to library service and leadership at several research universities, including the University of Virginia, University of Kansas, Syracuse University, University of California, Santa Barbara, and Washington University. Ms. Stephens has served in roles ranging from chief information officer and subject librarian to a range of managerial posts encompassing library services, digital libraries, program development, technology management, and administration. By the mid-2000s her portfolio included a combined library, IT, and organizational bandwidth that continues to inform her work.

At the University of California, Santa Barbara, she planned and executed the \$80 million expansion and update of the university's library. She also instituted a scholarly communications program and started the Interdisciplinary Research Collaboratory, a unit dedicated to data-centric study and research.

In 2017 Ms. Stephens joined Washington University as University Librarian. In this role she leads the Libraries' development as a strategic institutional asset and an essential resource in the advancement of the University's mission. Ms. Stephens also has served, or currently serves, on committees and boards of associations promoting diversity, information access, service innovation, shared investment, and information preservation. Organizations include the Association of Research Libraries, Bio One, the Digital Public Library of America, Association of College and Research Libraries, Mobius, the Federal Depository Library Council, and the Greater Western Library Association.
