



GROWTH THROUGH EXISTING RELATIONSHIPS

Small publishers added through their arrangements with Portico participants.

- Aggregator relationships (e.g., BioOne, Project Muse)
- Digital Commons, single agreement each publisher listed Portico participant
- Large and medium publishers (e.g. Elsevier, Oxford University Press, Sage, Springer, etc.), include titles from their society publishing programs in Portico



REMOVING OBSTACLES FOR SMALL PUBLISHERS

Minimize the technical barrier to entry, yet ensure a minimum content deposit to meet preservation needs.

- OJS Export plugin
- Spreadsheet metadata option
- Database export with no DTD
- Commitment to flexibility (some downloading of content, experimenting with crawling, working closely with publishers to assist their creation of proper content deposits)

POTENTIAL PATHWAYS TO FUTURE GROWTH

Creative business models

- Is it possible to reduce the minimum \$250 participation fee?
- May we preserve OA content without agreements?

Further reducing technical barriers

- Formalize the minimum amount of information required to allow us to move forward with preserving content
- Other platforms? RSS? Webcrawling via Heritrix? CrossRef metadata + PDF fetch?













28 publishers: 201 or greater


27 publishers: 101 to 200 titles

157 publishers: 21 to 100 titles

172 publishers: 11 to 20 titles

861 publishers: 3 to 10 titles

4,650 publishers: 1 or 2 titles

ROLE OF LIBRARIES

- Provide the names of specific publishers that are a high priority.
- Provide categories of publishers or platforms that are a high preservation priority.
